
## Grief Share



## Scholarship Fund

Were you aware that the church has a Scholarship Fund? The following is some information:

#### Qualifications

- Applicant must testify to the fact that he or she has had a personal experience of salvation.
- Applicant must be active in the life of the Shippensburg First Church of God.
- Applicant must be a full-time student in a curriculum leading to full-time Christian service.
- Applicant must maintain a 2.5 Grade Point Average and submit the appropriate document to show the academic standing.
- Applicant must apply every year and may not qualify for scholarship for more than four
- Applicant must be planning to enter full-time Christian service after graduation.

#### **Application process**

- Scholarship application will be processed only after the applicant submits the completed application to the Scholarship Trust Fund Committee by June 15.
- Applicant should be available to meet with Scholarship Trust Fund Committee for an interview between June 15 and August 1.






- † The Christian Education Committee will then review the recommendations and make the final decision.
- Each scholarship recipient will be awarded up to \$800 depending on the availability of funds.
- An additional award is available for Church members. This amount will be determined by CEC.
- ♦ Scholarship recipient(s) will be notified of decision by August 15.
- New application must be submitted for each year the applicant desires to be considered for scholarship.

If the scholarship recipient is not in full-time Christian ministry after graduation, we encourage them to donate to the Scholarship Fund supporting future scholarship recipients.

## **Recipe**—Pork with Cherry Sauce

- 1 small onion
- 1 can cherry pie filling
- ¼ cup vinegar
- ½ cup cooking sherry
- 1 pkt. Gravy mix for pork
- ½ cup water 2-3 lbs. pork roast cut
  - into pieces or 2-3 lbs. pork chops

In a food processor, finely chop an onion. Add pie filling and process until smooth. Add vinegar and sherry and blend. Marinate pork in sauce in refrigerator about 8 hours or overnight. Pre-heat oven to 325°F. Remove pork to baking pan and bake for an hour or until cooked thoroughly. Meanwhile, add water and gravy mix to sauce and cook over low heat until thick and bubbling. Serve hot over baked pork.

## +Christian Symbols + Ewer and basin

The ewer (a vaseshaped pitcher) and basin, which symbolize cleansing, are related to two biblical events from Holy Week: when Jesus washed his disciples' feet (John 13:1-

17), and when Pilate "washed his hands of" Jesus' blood before the crucifixion (Matthew 27:24). Because of the foot-washing, the ewer and basin have become a symbol of service ministry.

#### Coins

The Bible often uses coins to symbolize human greed. During Holy Week, 30 silver coins — usually shown with a bag or purse — represent Jesus' betrayal by his disciple Judas (Matthew 26:14-16). Many of Jesus' teachings are about money, including the parable of the lost

coin. Coins also symbolize giving as an act of worship, just as the widow offered her last "mite" (Mark 12:41-44).

## A Grand Entrance



Decades ago, as English actress
Gertrude Lawrence waited behind
the curtain for a reliable to th the curtain for a play to begin, the queen upstaged her by arriving at the royal box to much applause. "What an entrance," Lawrence

remarked, to which her friend, playwright Noel Coward, replied, "What a part!"

Jesus certainly made a grand entrance into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, entering to adoring shouts of "Hosanna!" But worldly glory and fame weren't his intent. Instead, our Lord knew that his Father had prepared a sacrificial role for him. Jesus handled the adulation with dignity and poise. The humble yet courageous Son of God knew that danger, despair and death awaited — but that he must endure it all to fulfill prophecy for humanity's


The pageantry of Palm Sunday is a stark contrast to the role of Suffering Servant that Jesus

faced a few short days later. Yet each event during Holy Week represents victory — for Jesus as well as for his beloved children.

Palm Sunday is a glorious day, so let us wave palms and shout, "Hosanna in the highest heaven!" The Savior has come. What an entrance! What a part!

### Maundy Thursday

The day before Maundy Shursday Good Friday is called Maundy Thursday. The word "Maundy" comes from the Latin word mandatum, which

## Four Lessons of Good Friday

The Rev. James Martin, S.J., author of Jesus: A Pilgrimage (HarperOne), writes that Jesus' suffering and death almost 2,000 years ago are very relevant to our 21st-century lives. He says Good Friday teaches us that:



1. physical and emotional suffering are part of

2. suffering isn't always the result of sin;

Jesus was fully human — and thus understands our humanity; and

suffering isn't the last word.

"The message of Good Friday is incomplete without Easter," Martin writes. "The story of the Passion is not simply of a man being brutally tortured, nailed to a cross and executed by the Romans. It's the story of a man who turns himself fully over to the Father's will, trusts that something new will come out of this offering and receives the astonishing gift of new life."








## SYMBOL OF SACRIFICE
